



CAREER DEVELOPMENT GRANTS FOR ARTISTS

Supporting Artists

For more than 35 years, the Prince Edward County Arts Council has had the privilege of **supporting professional events** that showcase the work of local artists. Our events annually generate upwards of \$250,000 in sales of art.

In 2017, we expanded our **support of local artists** by offering career development grants through the **Artist Fund**, an initiative that has since awarded over \$20,000 to local artists.

As an equal opportunity organization, we are committed to reflecting and including the diversity of our community to **foster a sense of belonging within our organization** by integrating principles of diversity, equity, inclusiveness and responsiveness into our policies, programs, partnerships and services.

Programs

Our membership is a diverse group of artists including painters, makers, photographers, illustrators, cinematographers, authors, designers, performers, and more! Emerging and established artists may apply to the Fund's various programs.

• Professional Development (\$1500)

Strengthen artist careers through learning.

• Market Development (\$1500)

Support artists as they develop new markets for their work.

• Public Art (\$2500)

Encourage the realization of public art projects in the community.


• Artists in the Community (\$2500)

Newly launched in 2020, this grant helps the community engage professional artists to realize art-focused projects, or to assist artists in realizing projects which directly engage residents.

In the program's inaugural year, three local artists were awarded funds to pursue professional development activities.

Total funds available: \$1,500

- Janice Edwards, Painter \$150 to attend Brush it Bold facilitated by Sheila Davis in PEC.
- Kate Golding, Surface Pattern Designer \$750 to attend School of Hustle facilitated by Instagram Business and Hedley & Bennett in Los Angeles.
- Tess Girard, Cinematographer \$600 to attend a Cinematic Lighting workshop facilitated by the Canadian Society of Cinematographers in Toronto.

Applications more than doubled in 2018, demonstrating a real need in the community. We supported a diverse range of artists and projects, and awarded our first Public Art grant!

- **Karole Marois**, Muralist \$112 to gain her *Working at Heights* certification.
- Katrina Tompkins, Furniture Designer \$600 to participate in Zanzibar Professional with CoDesign Abroad in Zanzibar, Africa.
- ♦ Gavin North, Performer \$450 to attend Winter Improv Festival and Tournament in Stratford, ON.
- ICE BOX PEC, Event \$1,500 to support the creation of interactive art installations by Chrissy Poitras and Andrea Piller.

In 2019, we awarded our first Market Development grant. This program allows artists to travel with their work in order to develop audiences and partnerships in new geographic regions. We also awarded our second Public Art grant to help a charitable organization realize a new project.

Total funds available: \$4,500

- Kamee Abrahamian, Filmmaker \$800 to premiere their short film *Transmission* at the Vancouver Queer Film Festival, Vancouver, BC.
- Dawn Middleton, Ceramist \$425 to attend a Slip-casting Mold Systems Workshop with Peter Pincus, Richmond Hill, ON.
- Danielle Reddick, Visual Artist \$1,500 commissioned by Glenwood Cemetery to create a sculpture in commemoration of the 75th anniversary of D-Day. Installed in the cemetery in summer 2020.

In 2020, we awarded our first Artists in the Community grant. This program assists artist members in realizing a community-based art project to directly engage residents. We also awarded two exciting Public Art grants that safely engaged the community during the global pandemic.

Total funds available: \$6,000

- The Department of Illumination, Artistic Company \$750 for the Boxtopia Canada Day Challenge, challenging community members to construct iconic Canadian imagery from cardboard
- Nella Casson, Multidisciplinary Artist \$1500 to support Looking Out, Looking Up, a socially-distanced summer exhibition of window boxes with colourful and familiar painted and embroidered imagery, set in thriving storefronts on Picton Main St.
- Dianne Kehoe, Painter \$1500 from the Artists in the Community Grant towards The Joy of Sketching and Watercolour Painting, a creative and therapeutic online workshop developed for seniors.

As the pandemic continued to impact our lives in 2021, we supported artists who found new ways to engage with audiences.

Total funds available: \$6,000

- Ophelia Spinosa, Filmmaker \$400 from the Market Development program to help with distribution costs related to her short film *Fruits of Labour*. Ophelia is an early-career artist.
- Arwyn Carpenter, Dancer & Choreographer \$1000 to support Dancing with Rainbows, an Artists in the Community project in partnership with Reaching for Rainbows, a program focused on empowering girls aged 6-9.
- The Department of Illumination, Artistic Company \$1500 to support *Tiny Town Aglow*, a COVID-safe project to replace in-person artist-guided lantern-building workshops. Community-made lanterns were on display in Books & Company window on Main Street, Picton in fall 2021.
- Conrad Beaubien, Playwright \$1500 from the Public Art program to support a free outdoor public reading of his new play based on local historical events, titled *The Boxcar Cowboy*.

The Artist Fund continued to support artists in various ways in 2022, with projects engaging youth in the community, transforming downtown Picton, and assisting with artists' career education and development.

Total funds available: \$6,000

- Kirei Samuel, Glass Artist \$2500 from the Artists in the Community program for The Power of Words project in partnership with The Hub, for youth aged 9 to 12 years to choose words that resonate with themselves and themes of self-esteem. The words, written on pieces of glass, were then fused together and hung as a piece of art.
- Angela Lavender, Mixed Media Artist \$500 from the Market Development program to participate in Art Battle Québec, a live painting competition against 11 fellow artists.
- Karole Marois, Painter \$500 from the Professional Development program to become a Lifetime Member of the Art Business Academy, to further artistic development and provide ongoing guidance and mentorship, following Jason Horej's online art workshops for artists.
- Tomas Del Balso, Multidisciplinary Artist \$2500 from the Public Art program to fund Forever Wild, a semi-permanent mural hung on the outside walls of Carbon Art & Design in downtown Picton.
